Elder abuse is:



- physical, sexual, or psychological abuse, as well as neglect, abandonment, and financial exploitation of an older person by another person or entity,
- that occurs in any setting (e.g., home, community, or facility),
- either in a relationship where there is an expectation of trust and/or when an older person is targeted based on age or disability.




Accessing Victim Services About 16% of all stalking victims sought victim services. Nearly 1 in 4 victims who sought victim services did not receive any.






Poll: Is this Stalking?

A supervisor regularly asks her employee personal questions, mocks him in meetings, sends e-mails at odd hours, and is verbally abusive when he doesn't respond right away.




Screening for Stalking 52 Has the Offender

Intersections of Sexual Violence and Stalking

How Offenders Groom for Sexual Violence

- 1. Research and identify vulnerable victims
- 2. Establish relationships: contact, build trust
- 3. Meet in-person and isolate the victim
- 4. Coerce into sexual act(s)
- 5. Contact after



Possible disadvantages to labeling stalking as "elder abuse."

- May allow ageist assumptions to impact potential response/investigation
- People tend not to think of stalking as a crime experienced by older victims
- Typical elder abuse services may not address the specific dynamics of stalking
- May diminish others' perceptions of the victim's experience if we apply a term with a broader meaning than 'stalking'




First Response


Any time a victim reports any kind of harassing behavior:


- Consider the possibility of a stalking case
- Determine whether this is an isolated incident or repeated conduct

Safety Planning


Jointly create a plan to enhance safety. Consider:

- · Where will the victim live, if not at home?
- · Does the victim have access to resources?
- Are there health issues that affect the options available to the victim?
- · Who else is affected by the stalking?
- What legal issues need to be addressed in the safety plan?










